*A link to Easybib is available on the Rockford Christian Virtual Learning Commons page. Easybib makes giving credit a very simple process!

*Punctuation is very important! Make sure you know where commas, colons and periods should be placed.

*Your bibliography must be in alphabetical order by author.

*Titles of books, magazines and web sites should be in *italics* not underlined.

*Include if the source is print or web based.

*You no longer need to include the web address in your citation unless requested by the teacher.

*If you are using pictures, place the web address from the actual picture's site, under the picture.

*Format is 12 point Arial or Times New Roman.

*Double Space the whole document.

*Make sure the second line of on individual citation is indented.
